## Milestone year for Power to Heal campaign

The past 75 years have seen the Jewish General Hospital become a leading medical and research institution, as well as a pillar of our community. Therefore, it is fitting that the largest and most ambitious fundraising campaign in JGH history—one that has fuelled tremendous growth and development—is entering its last leg as our hospital celebrates its 75th anniversary.

The Power to Heal campaign has proven to be highly compelling and effective in rallying support from every sector of the Montreal community. Indeed, we are confident that, with your continued support, we will reach the campaign's goal of \$200 million by the end of 2009.

This fiscal year alone, thanks to your support and partnership, there have been many outstanding achievements, including construction of the new main entrance and the bright, modern lobby, along with the adjoining garden; extensive renovations to the Larry & Cookie Rossy and Family Palliative Care Unit, the Brownstein Department of Emergency Medicine and the 8 North West Unit; expansion of the Division of Radiation Oncology; acquisition of the Rapid Arc linear accelerator and the PACS digital X-ray imaging archive system; establishment of the Guerrera Family Career Scientist Award for Excellence in Breast Cancer Research; the opening of the new Airways Centre for asthma patients; and the acquisition of new beds and furniture throughout the hospital.

Other new and exciting initiatives are also currently underway and will need your renewed financial support to come to fruition, among which are: renovations to the 6 North West Geriatrics Medicine Unit; the expansion and renovation of the Divisions of Cardiology and Endocrinology Ambulatory Centres, of the out-patient services of the Division of Geriatrics Medicine and of the Memory Clinic; the relocation and expansion of the Test Centre; the development of the Women's Care Centre; and the construction of the very first Centre for Child Development and Mental Health in Quebec.

In the unique relationships and inspiring partnerships we enjoy with our fellow Montrealers lies the foundation of our continued success in meeting the ever-increasing healthcare needs of Quebecers and providing the best care for all. The impressive advances resulting from our combined efforts to date provide living evidence that we, as individuals and as a group, do have the Power to Heal. ■

## Big changes for one of the hospital's biggest divisions

*Recent years have seen a boom in diabetes diagnoses. For the JGH Division of Endocrinology, it has meant a huge increase in patient visits, now totalling over 20,000 per year. Bigger numbers mean greater responsibility—one that Dr. Mark Trifiro, the division's Chief, feels readier than ever to meet, especially since receiving transformative donations.*

**S**ufficient office space and workspace are critical to maintaining and continually improving patient care, treating the ever-growing number of people requiring specialized services, and supporting ongoing clinical research. Nowhere is this more evident than in the major growth and progress that have taken place in the Endocrine and Diabetes Unit during 2008-2009.

Thanks to the generous contribution of Karen and Murray Dalfen and other donors, and with your ongoing support, the unit is undergoing a sizeable expansion to increase its area by nearly 70 per cent. The extra space will allow one

of the biggest and busiest divisions in the JGH to accommodate new doctors, nurses and dietitians, all of whom are in great demand. Space will also be available for a new, dedicated clinical research unit, where researchers will be able to conduct quality control studies and better assess the efficacy of certain therapeutic regimens, while introducing new ones. The expansion will allow many more patients and their families to benefit from first-class educational tools to help manage chronic diseases. Your continued support will fuel the modernization of the division by introducing computerized technology for record-keeping and registration, which will contribute to greater accuracy of patient information and will considerably reduce waiting times for patients.

These major improvements mean better management of patients' conditions, better health and an enhanced quality of life—far-reaching benefits that are the direct outcome of your generosity and commitment. ■

## Donors keep JGH at cutting edge of cardiac research

*Support for state-of-the-art facilities is critical if clinical scientists are to conduct research that advances health science.*

Since joining the Jewish General Hospital's Division of Cardiology in 2008, Dr. Sven Wassmann has seen great strides made in discovering ways to reduce the occurrence and impact of common cardiac diseases.

His highly innovative and promising work involves the basic concept of tapping into the body's natural ability to heal itself. In particular, his research focuses on finding a way to use the body's own repair mechanisms to prevent the underlying disease, namely arteriosclerosis or hardening of arteries, which causes heart attacks. The objective is to prevent them altogether, or to reduce their severity (thereby causing less damage), ensure faster recovery and lessen the chances of recurrence.

The research endowment that has enabled Dr. Wassmann to join the JGH and carry out his award-winning research would not have been possible without the generous gifts of key donors. Your support and partnership have also played a

vital role in bringing about the extensive renovations and expansion of the Division of Cardiology, which has resulted in a more comfortable and efficient environment for the benefit of patients and staff.

Being able to count on superior facilities and leading clinical scientists is the key to providing the highest quality of care and, with your continued support, keeping the JGH at the cutting edge of international cardiac research for years to come. ■

## Peace and light for Palliative Care Unit

**T**he JGH Marjorie & Gerald Bronfman Division of Palliative Care has received numerous accolades for the outstanding calibre of its team of doctors and nurses, and for the exceptionally high quality of care that they provide. Yet, in previous years, the 17-bed Unit faced increasing difficulty in doing all it could for patients in a delicate phase of life. Fortunately, the ongoing generosity of donors has helped the Larry & Cookie Rossy and Family Palliative Care Unit to truly reflect its exceptionally bright team and the excellent care that has always been their hallmark.

The greatest change was to make the environment of the unit more welcoming and comfortable for patients and their loved ones. Gone are the days of three patients to a room; now each patient benefits from a private room or a large semi-private room with plenty of space between neighbours. These newly renovated rooms feature modern ventilation systems with humidity control and air conditioning, as well as new sleeper chairs that make spending the night a comfortable option for family and loved ones. Renovated bathrooms also allow wheelchair-bound patients greater independence and mobility.

Comfort is of the utmost importance. Patients can prepare their own food in one of two kitchens. The isolation of hospital living is greatly eased by a large family room outfitted with comfortable sofas and chairs, a flat-screen TV with cable and

dedicated movie channels, and a computer with internet access. Internet jacks were also installed at every patient's bed, giving them access to vital networks of friends and support beyond the hospital.

Peripheral lighting has replaced the constant glare of overhead fluorescents, while anti-glare blinds allow patients to control the natural light. Patient comfort and safety have also been greatly increased by the inclusion of additional sinks in corridors and double rooms, and by the purchase of new beds.

These major improvements have made a world of difference in the quality of patients' daily lives, helping them to regain a sense of dignity and belonging. Thanks to partnerships with generous and supportive families, the unit is now a much brighter and peaceful place, as it should be. ■

## Paving the way for personalized cancer treatment

*For the Segal Cancer Centre, the list of inspired partnerships is a long one, and with every passing year, new donor partnerships and collaborations create opportunities for breakthroughs in cancer research, treatment and care.*

**T**he Guerrero Family Career Scientist Award for Excellence in Breast Cancer Research enabled Dr. Mark Basik, world-renowned breast surgeon and clinical researcher working at the JGH Segal Cancer Centre, to pursue new and innovative research.

Dr. Basik runs a major tumour biomarker program, which collects blood samples from breast cancer patients and looks for biomarkers, tumour-associated proteins or genes identified from the primary tumour, circulating cancer cells, blood serum or metastatic tissue. These biomarkers can predict the patient's response or resistance to certain types of treatment; using this information, doctors can devise effective treatment programs with a greater likelihood of success. Dr. Basik's innovative approach and work are revolutionizing breast cancer treatment by yielding significant benefits for patients.

With the ongoing support of generous donors and partners, the Segal Cancer Centre is also pursuing personalized cancer care by developing innovative, multidisciplinary programs to address the unique medical and psychosocial needs of patients from different age groups. Most notable are the Bell Canada Adolescent and Young Adult Oncology Program for cancer patients between the ages of 18 and 39; and the Geriatric Oncology Program for patients over 70 years old.

We are confident that, with the continued involvement of the public and private sectors, as well as the staunch support of long-standing partners, these groundbreaking initiatives will result in additional advances and become role models for the rest of the country, ultimately benefiting all cancer patients and their loved ones. ■

## The Weekend to End Breast Cancer

**T**he Weekend to End Breast Cancer is an incredibly emotional experience that brings together people from all walks of life for a common cause.

A total of 2,250 people participated in the fourth edition of the two day, 60-kilometre walk. Encouraged along the way by well-wishers, participants walked the streets of Montreal on a sunny summer weekend, raising just over \$6 million for research, prevention and treatment of breast cancer at the JGH Segal Cancer Centre. The event's appeal is undeniable, and the same can be said of its impact.

Thanks to the outstanding efforts and generosity of participants, sponsors and supporters, the JGH has been able to make advances and sustain ongoing initiatives on many fronts in the battle against breast cancer. Among these are:

- discovery of a breast cancer predisposition in families with a history of breast cancer
- ongoing identification of blood biomarkers that will further the development of personalized medicine and enable doctors to give more effective and less toxic treatments to breast cancer patients.
- pioneering work in evaluating and establishing robotic surgery for treating gynaecologic cancers. This form of

minimally invasive surgery is highly precise, permitting quick recovery.

- purchase of a confocal spinning disk microscope, facilitating high-resolution, multidimensional and live-cell fluorescent imaging, enabling a tumour cell or group of tumour cells to be tracked in real time. Since this system can also be used to identify new drug targets for chemotherapy and sensitization to other cancer therapies, it will have a major impact on research.
- design of targeted therapies for breast cancer and the study of mechanisms involved in developing resistance to anticancer agents
- exploration of factors influencing the decision-making process when women are faced with difficult decisions about managing their breast cancer risk
- awarding WEBC Studentships and Fellowships to support innovative research by leading minds in the next generation of cancer researchers

Together we are making a big difference. On behalf of all of the women and men affected by breast cancer, their loved ones and the JGH, we thank you from the bottom of our hearts and we look forward to renewing our fruitful partnership in the years ahead. ■

## The Auxiliary, a long-standing partner in patient care

*Though the JGH Women's Auxiliary was officially founded in 1936, its true beginnings are as old as the hospital itself. Since day 1, The Auxiliary's mandate has been to improve patient care by forging partnerships with the JGH and the community. Seventy-five years later, The Auxiliary is going strong and making a world of difference for patients and their families every day.*

**E**ach year, The Auxiliary receives requests from many hospital departments; its members meet with the JGH Equipment Prioritization Committee to assess the most pressing needs. Through various fundraising initiatives, Auxiliary businesses and partnerships are formed with key third-parties, and significant sums are raised to purchase important medical equipment.

For example, The Auxiliary's ongoing partnership with Philips Lifeline—a telephone helpline with more than 1,000 subscribing seniors and people at risk—continues to bring over \$60,000 a year to the Division of Geriatric Medicine. This enables the division to buy beds, special pillows, chairs

and other items to ensure the well-being and quality care of elderly patients.

During 2008-2009, thanks to ongoing support and partnership from caring members of the hospital community, The Auxiliary raised just over \$1 million. This is an achievement of great consequence, since it helped in the acquisition of specialized workstations for the Department of Radiology, a high-definition colonoscope for the Division of Colorectal Surgery, seven beds in the hospital's Feeling Bedder campaign, and ongoing development of a state-of-the-art Emergency Department Learning Centre.

Yet, there is no end to the improvements that can be made to patient care, or to making the hospital a warmer place. Therefore, The Auxiliary is always ready to welcome new members, young and old, into the fold. The simple gesture of devoting a day or half-day a week can make an enormous difference in the lives of so many. Being part of this great tradition of selfless giving and dedicated service is truly a life-changing experience. ■

## Taking Hope & Cope to a new level

*When a newly diagnosed cancer patient, who is fearful and anxious, walks into the hospital, only to emerge more hopeful and in control, the difference can be traced to a support system with a solid grasp on the realities of living with cancer; plus a healthy attitude toward coping with it. Nearing the end of its third decade, Hope & Cope continues to lead the way in psychosocial cancer support in Quebec.*

**F**or over 28 years, Hope & Cope, a community-funded organization working in close partnership with the Segal Cancer Centre, has been addressing the human side of cancer, including the psychological, social and spiritual needs of the whole person. In doing so, it helps people cope with the emotional and practical challenges of cancer by providing education, information, support and inspiration to patients and their families.

During 2008-2009, two major events, Denim & Diamonds and Soirée Fantastique, raised over \$1 million to support Hope & Cope's main office and satellites in the Jewish General Hospital, as well as the JGH Hope & Cope Wellness Centre on Côte-Sainte-Catherine Road.

In the Fall of 2008, a unique partnership between Hope & Cope and a committed community donor led to the establishment of a new Chair at McGill University: the Christine & Herschel Victor Hope & Cope Chair in Psychosocial Oncol-

ogy. This is the first Chair of its kind in Quebec and only the third in all of Canada.

The researcher who occupies this Chair will be located at the JGH and work in tandem with Hope & Cope and the Segal Cancer Centre's Psychosocial Oncology program. By focusing on cancer survivorship, this research will help determine the type of interventions and programs that improve the quality of life and well-being of cancer survivors.

This groundbreaking development illustrates how partners can complement each other to help the many people who have been touched by cancer. ■
