Since 1991, the Memory Clinic has conducted and contributed to major studies that address the complexities of dementia using patient-centred research. Serving 500 to 700 patients per year, the Clinic has developed sophisticated tools for assessing and identifying cognitive issues and offers the most current approaches for patient evaluation and treatment.

Key role in the development of the MoCA test, a brief memory test that examines different areas of cognition, and is available in several languages


Recent Success
